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## Get Ready for the FTC’s Non-Compete Ban, But Do

In July, federal courts in Texas and Pennsylvania reached opposite conclusions about whether the FTC’s non-ban, set to take effect September 4, is lawful. The [I judge held the ban was probably unlawful](#), but it only issued a preliminary injunction that affected the five entities in the case. The [Pennsylvania judge concluded the ban is within the FTC’s authority](#), and it denied the plaintiff’s preliminary challenge. The Texas court is going to issue its final decision on the merits August 30, and there is also a case in Florida challenging the rule. Employers should prepare for September 4, but with the knowledge that the rule still may be struck down before then.

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Pennsylvania Governor Josh Shapiro signed into law a bill that will significantly curtail restrictive covenants for health care practitioners, including medical doctors and physician assistants. [HB1633, which will go into effect January 1, 2025](#), limits “noncompete covenants” with health care practitioners to one year after separation only if the practitioner was not terminated by the employer. The new law also requires employers to give certain notice to patients when a practitioner leaves.

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### Double-Check Compliance for Covered Employees under the NLRA

An Administrative Law Judge with the NLRB ruled in [a recent decision](#) that an [employer's non-competition and employee recruitment solicitation provisions violated the NLRA](#), reasoning that such provisions interfered with the employee's ability to engage in protected activity. But a few weeks later, the NLRB's Office of Advice issued a [memo concluding that a non-competition provision in an employee's Shareholder Agreement is unlawful](#), primarily because the Shareholder Agreement was entered voluntarily rather than as a condition of employment. The NLRB's position on restrictive covenants is [now fast-moving](#), so work with your attorneys to ensure you are staying ahead of the curve.

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### Make Sure Your Agreement is Not a “Pile of Words”

The [non-compete in this July 18 case](#) was governed by Delaware law, applied to a C-suite employee, and contained detailed definitions of the plaintiff company, competing businesses, the restricted territory, and the prohibited behavior – all factors presumably favoring enforcement. In this decision, the Chancellor found that the company's agreement's interlocking, expansive definitions of non-compete, ultimately, a “pile of words.” The court used a “blue pencil” to make it reasonable and denied the plaintiff's motion for a preliminary injunction.
